A REFLECTION BY RYAN SULLIVAN

We often reminisce about our first visit to The Children's House. We scheduled a tour because my wife, Jessica, was pregnant with our first child, Shamus. When we entered The Children's House, the environment was unusually calm. This was a noticeable and welcome difference from the other daycares/schools we had toured in the area. Jessica had worked in a traditional daycare growing up and knew immediately that The Children's House was different. As we learned more about this special place, we recognized that each detail was intentional. It was more than just keeping our kids safe, The Children's House focused on development and community from the earliest age. Little did we know the impact this magical place would have on our family.

Fast forward ... three more kids (Paddy, Kathryn, and Siobhan), and 13 years later, Shamus is in his last year at Compass Junior High. We are in that bittersweet reflection period. This community has been another home for our family. It is where Jessica and I have grown as parents. You can't help but think about what is next. What does that look like? Many before us have experienced this transition and we know that our school has consistently provided a supportive and nurturing environment. The Children's House community met this 10-day challenge by raising \$27,500 including the \$12,500 match!

GRANDPARENTS GIVING BACK

After spending years living outside of New York City, the couple returned to Traverse City in 1981, raising their four children on the beautiful shores of Long Lake. Recently, they have transitioned to seasonal residents, but their commitment to the community remains strong, especially when it comes to supporting The Children's House.

The couple's ties to The Children's House began with their firstborn, Jason, in 1984. The Griffin's four children all spent time at The Children's House throughout the years, and their passion for quality education never wavered. When their grandchildren, Annie and Nolan, were born, Jim and Kelley made it a priority to ensure they received the best possible educational experience at The Children's House. They are consistently impressed by the dedication of the staff and the overall nurturing environment that fosters individual growth. The couple believes that the unique sense of community at The Children's House differentiates it from other educational opportunities, creating an atmosphere where children thrive.

As advocates for The Children's House, Jim and Kelley are inspired to give back, motivated by their own educational journeys and the success it has brought them. They have witnessed firsthand how The Children's House instills confidence, independent thought, and strong skills in their grandchildren—qualities that set them apart from peers at other schools. The fond memories of their grandchildren learning to take initiative, like tidying up without prompting, reflect the positive impact of The Children's House experience. Jim and Kelley envision a lasting influence on their grandchildren, equipping them with the tools they need to navigate their futures with confidence and success.

LEARNING THROUGH SERVING

Community is central to learning at The Children's House and Compass Montessori Junior High. These young people are learning to become good citizens and are quite capable and motivated to make a difference through community service.

Montessorians describe children in the second plane of development (ages 6 to 12) as full of wonder and having a strong sense of justice. When given the freedom to explore ideas and inspiration to learn more, students at The Children's House organically create ways to make an impact outside of their classrooms.

In 2021, then 4th year student, Mollie Janiszewski, wrote an independent research paper on Ruby Bridges and then raised enough money to invite Ms. Bridges to speak via Zoom with all of the Elementary and Junior High students. The children were in awe of Ruby's bravery and reflected on the impact one person can have on improving the world. Inspired by her actions, classes have followed their interests and created plans to make the world a better place in their own way.

Student projects inspired by Ruby Bridges have included sponsoring families through Paper Angels (a program of Child and Family Services), writing cards to children in hospitals, collecting items and food for those in need, starting a petition to ban plastic bags at local grocery stores, planting trees, raising money for the Women's Resources Center (by creating and selling cookbooks), and projects shown in pictures on this page.

FEATURED ALUMNI: ELLIOTT PETTY



After growing up at The Children's
House, Elliott Petty graduated from
Culver Academy in 2013 and earned a
B.S. in Business Administration, Project
Management, from Elon University in 2017.
He currently works for a software company
in Grand Rapids and focuses on technology
for the banking and lending industry.
Outside of work, he enjoys tackling a long
list of home improvement projects and
spending as much time as possible in
Leland during the summer, rock hunting,
and feeling connected to nature.

When asked about his time at The Children's House, Elliott replied, "I think about Patty a lot. She was an incredible teacher." Patty Anton was the first Upper Elementary Guide at The Children's House, developing a foundation for Montessori elementary education through 6th grade. Reminiscing about his time in Upper El, the trips away from school like camping, kayaking, and visiting the State House in Lansing were the most memorable experiences. But it was the everyday unique experiences at school that, only now as an adult, he recognizes as extremely valuable. For example, Elliott remembers not being allowed to go into the woods at recess. The reason why has long escaped his memory, but what stuck with him was how Patty used that experience to teach him how to make a mature and diplomatic request. She showed him how to write and present a petition to the Head of School. "Now as an adult, I find myself thinking: What would Patty do in a situation like this?"

"The older I get the more I appreciate having a lifelong love of learning. When I was a kid, I didn't understand what that meant, but I definitely recognize now the effect on my character." He acknowledges that the teachers did not teach him what to think but focused on critical thinking: how to learn, work, and complete research projects. It was all valuable in developing him into who he is and how he approaches his life and work today. Growing up with Montessori teachers guiding and modeling how to treat everyone with respect, to care about your neighbor, and the value of compassion shaped the way he thinks about the world today. "To me, lifelong learning means to be willing to learn something new, and this mindset has helped me develop along the career path I'm on today."

Twenty years ago, on November 3, 2004, Children's House parent, Dr. Karen Gilhooley, and students Anna Maas, Rowan Sanford, and Sierra Fetterolf were lost in a tragic car accident. We honor them every year when we plant daffodils, notice the quilts dedicated to them in the halls of our school, spend time in the sculpture garden and labyrinth, and attend the annual Karen Circle luncheon.

Since 2005, women in our school community have come together to help children learn to live healthy and active lives. Inspired by Dr. Karen Gilhooly's commitment to healthy lifestyles, members of our giving circle make things happen that are outside of our school's general operating budget. The group's cumulative gift now totals \$338,000.
